

St. Paul's Acolyte Corps consists of those young people in the parish who are interested in this important and rewarding service. Acolytes serve in a variety of roles each week: the Head Crucifer leads the opening procession and the retiring procession, the Torch Bearers escort the Deacon into the aisle for the reading of the Gospel, the Servers assist the deacon or priest as they set up for communion. Acolytes also perform a variety of other roles as needed for special services such as Weddings and Memorial Services.

Each year, a Head Acolyte is appointed by the Verger and Priest from among the corps of acolytes. The Head Acolyte serves 12 months from January of the junior year through December of the senior year in High School. In this position of honor, the Head Acolyte is responsible for the scheduling of the Acolytes each week and for helping the Verger with annual acolyte training. Anyone interested should speak to the Verger or attend one of the training sessions.

Altar Guild

The work of the Altar Guild is an essential part of the worship services at St. Paul's. Teams of 3 or 4 serve two months per year and are responsible for the preparation and clean up for each worship service. Other duties include maintaining the silver serving vessels of the Communion, Altar candles, hangings and Sacristy orderliness.

The Linen Committee is comprised of Altar Guild members as well as anyone interested in the maintenance of our linens. St. Paul's is fortunate to have many lovely memorial linens that require delicate cleaning and handling.

St. Paul's is a beautiful, historic church, and the Altar Guild is proud to do its part in keeping St. Paul's ready for all aspects of the Church year.

Angel Tree

The Angel Tree is erected and decorated at the beginning of each Advent season. Parishioner participation can be for as little as 20 minutes, up to several hours. After the Tree is erected, a small number of creative workers sets up the Crèche (manger scene) at the base of the tree and appropriately moves the figures as we progress toward the celebration of the Nativity. Following Epiphany, the full group reconvenes to dismantle and store the tree, along with all the angels and Crèche figures.

In the "off season," there are a few necessary administrative tasks - arranging for the repair of any broken angels, record keeping of those donations made to the Angel Tree Fund, recording those gifts in the Memory Book, sending notes of appreciation and acknowledgement to donors and honorees, and proofing lists of those honored and memorialized in the Bulletin for Christmas. Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

At St. Paul's, the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is a rich experience for children ages 3 through 5th grade that gives children the opportunity to know and fall in love with the Good Shepherd and the God who knows and loves each one of them. Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is an approach to the religious formation of children that is rooted in the Bible, the liturgy of the church, and the educational principles of Maria Montessori. Children gather in an "atrium", a room especially prepared just for them. The atrium contains simple but beautiful materials that enable children to absorb the most essential proclamations of our Christian faith.

With five trained Catechists, we usually have the help that we need. However, we occasionally have something special planned that requires extra hands-or, we may have

Ideally, we like to have teams of 2-4 parishioners who work together during their month of service (or who split up the Sundays in their month) to purchase the food (coffee and paper goods are always provided by the Church), set up the table, make coffee, and clean up afterwards (including taking soiled linens home to wash and return as needed).

The committee also manages a limited budget from the Vestry for donations to local, charitable organizations that have meaning for our church members, such as Beacon of Hope, Brook Hill Horse Farm, Interfaith Outreach Association, Meals on Wheels and various others. While this is an oversight committee only, all of its members are active participants in outreach for St. Paul's.


